



The organic certification prevents from using genetically modified organisms in their culture. It supports the grower's engagement not to use genetically modified seeds. Unfortunately, that certification doesn't have any authority against the potential cross contamination due to pollination or some species mutations. The corn is one of the first grain that if there is GMO used in a field, the chances that a nearby organic field would be contaminated are very high.

Today, in Canada, there is no wheat created by GMO. The cross contamination due to pollination can't happened unless there is species mutation. The risk is very low but still exists.

There is no guarantee that organic products don't contain GMO, nevertheless, the organic grower will guarantee that he will not use any. There is still a risk of GMO contamination and it will remain as is as long as it will be accepted in Canadian agricultural production.
